

Nursing and Midwifery Council consultation on the standards for supervisors of midwives

Section 1 - Introduction

The Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC) is the UK regulatory body for nurses and midwives. Its primary aim is to protect the public. Statutory supervision of midwives supports protection of the public by promoting best practice, preventing poor practice and intervening in unacceptable practice. Using the supervisory framework appropriately should enable further improvements in standards of midwifery care and thereby improved outcomes for women.

The Nursing and Midwifery Order 2001 (The Order) requires the Council 'to establish from time to time standards of education, training, conduct and performance for nurses and midwives and to ensure the maintenance of those standards' (Article 3 (2)). The Order also provides for the Council to make rules to regulate the practice of midwifery and the supervision of midwives.

These rules and their related guidance are contained within the Midwives rules and standards (NMC, 2012). The rules and standards prescribe the qualifications of those that may be appointed as a supervisor of midwives. They also require those midwives wishing to become supervisors of midwives to undertake courses of instruction to ensure they have the competencies necessary to undertake this role.

This programme of education has been developed for the purpose of preparing those midwives, who upon successful completion, intend to seek appointment as a supervisor of midwives. Entry onto the programme therefore, will require the midwife to undergo the relevant local supervising authority's (LSA) selection process. Successful completion and appointment will be notified to the NMC by the LSA so that this can be noted against the midwife's entry on the Register.

Statutory supervision of midwives is a UK requirement; however, it is acknowledged that it is undertaken in country and region specific contexts. It would be essential for the local supervising authority to provide such detailed information relevant to the country or region to enable the supervisor of midwives to undertake the role effectively.

Revised standards have been drafted for supervisors of midwives and for supervisor of midwives education programmes. This consultation seeks your views on these revised draft standards. These revised standards, once approved by Council, will replace the Standards for the preparation and practice of supervisors of midwives (NMC, 2006).

The standards for supervisors of midwives underpin the principles of statutory supervision of midwives within the context of the full scope and range of midwifery practice. Whilst undertaking the supervisor of midwives programme, midwives will be required to demonstrate they are proficient in all the competencies through theoretical and practical assessment. Following programme completion, these are benchmark competencies against which a supervisor of midwives performance in practice can be measured.

They are grouped into the following domains:

- 1.1 Professional values
- 1.2 Communication and interpersonal skills
- 1.3 Supervision in practice and decision-making
- 1.4 Leadership and team working

The requirements of approved education institutions (AEI's) wishing to provide programmes for which the NMC sets standards are now contained within the recently published NMC Quality assurance framework, *For nursing and midwifery education and local supervising authorities for midwifery Annexe 1 Requirements of approved education institutions* (NMC, 2013). The requirements for education providers wishing to provide the programme assume that these generic requirements have been met. The education standards define further specific standards for the delivery of the supervisor of midwives programme which must be met by AEIs.

The proposals put forward for consultation have been drawn up taking into account the review and publication of the revised Midwives rules and standards (2012), feedback from workshops and seminars undertaken with the lead midwives for education and LSA Midwifery Officers and consideration of student evaluations received from AEIs.

Your response to this consultation

Section 2 - Standards for supervisors of midwives

Domain 1: Professional values

Supervisors of midwives must:

1. Understand the statutory framework for the supervision of midwives and the role of the NMC and the LSA in protecting the public.

2. Understand, adhere to and apply the NMC standards, guidance and related information in their practice as a supervisor of midwives, in particular The code: Standards of conduct, performance and ethics for nurses and midwives, the Midwives rules and standards and LSA guidelines on the supervision of midwives.

3. Understand the role of a supervisor of midwives including their role in providing support and guidance to women who access maternity services.

4. Enable and monitor midwives to maintain their competence by:

- meeting with supervisees at least once a year and maintaining appropriate records of these events

- ensuring midwives are aware of their responsibilities regarding registration, Intention to Practice (ITP) notification and renewal of registration

- ensuring midwives reflect on and adhere to NMC rules, standards and code of conduct

- ensuring midwives undertake continuous professional development relevant to the scope of their practice

- providing support for midwives to implement continually improving standards of care

- encouraging midwives to adopt an evidence based-approach towards the delivery of care

- encouraging midwives to give advice and support to women who experience difficulties in making choices about their care

- encouraging midwives to evaluate and reflect on their practice through multiple sources such as women, colleagues and their employer

- undertaking audits of their midwifery records and gaining feedback from women to whom they have provided care

- sharing information and exploring topical issues relating to their practice as a midwife during supervisory meetings

- initiating remedial action where appropriate

- acting as a role model for midwives

Domain 2: Communication and interpersonal skills

Supervisors of midwives must:

1. Support and work collaboratively with midwives working with complex ethical, legal and professional issues.

2. Work in partnership with women and create opportunities for women to engage actively with and influence maternity service provision.

3. Support and work collaboratively with supervisor of midwives colleagues and members of multidisciplinary and governance teams to improve standards of care and ensure a safe service to women and their families.

4. Engage with a wide variety of individuals, groups, agencies and organisations at local and national levels.

5. Recognise when people are anxious or in distress and respond using therapeutic principles to promote their wellbeing, manage personal safety and resolve conflict.

6. Use effective communication strategies and negotiation techniques to achieve best outcomes, respecting the dignity and human rights of all concerned and know when to consult a third party and make referrals for advocacy, mediation or arbitration.

Domain 3: Supervision in practice and decision-making

Supervisors of midwives must:

1. Understand statutory supervision within the context of local governance policies and procedures.

2. Contribute to the development and monitoring of NMC standards and LSA guidelines in relation to the supervision of midwives.

3. Contribute to the development and operation of local frameworks that will enable student midwives to have access to a supervisor of midwives.

4. Be able to source literature, research and evidence-based practice to support effective strategy and service development in relation to the supervision of midwives and midwifery practice.

5. Use appropriate strategies to support midwives to maximise their potential in practice.

6. Apply appropriate procedures to identify and remediate the conduct and competence of midwives in accordance with the Midwives rules and standards.

7. Operate in a way that takes account of all equality and diversity issues, ensuring a fair, honest and transparent approach to the supervision of midwives.

8. Provide additional advice and support to women who are experiencing difficulty in achieving their care choices.

Domain 4: Leadership and team working

Supervisors of midwives must:

1. Research and apply best practice in motivation and leadership and provide visible leadership in the workplace.

2. Develop multidisciplinary team working which encourages mutual respect and values the contribution of all parties.

3. Be self aware, recognising own values, principles and assumptions.

4. Undertake continuing professional development in the supervision of midwives.

5. Appraise and modify performance as a supervisor of midwives by learning from experience, through feedback, reflection and evaluation.

6. Develop an understanding of the strategic and political factors which may influence the provision of maternity services.

7. Provide support to women who raise concerns in relation to the care they have received and, work in partnership with members of the multidisciplinary and governance teams to investigate and respond appropriately and in a timely manner to address these concerns.

Section 3 - Education standards for supervisors of midwives programme

Standard 1: Safeguarding the public. Nursing and midwifery education must be consistent with The Code: Standards of conduct, performance and ethics for nurses and midwives (NMC 2007).

The supervisors of midwives programme will be offered in NMC approved educational institutions (AEIs). It will be approved and monitored in accordance with the NMC Quality assurance framework (QAF).

Standard 3: Processes for selection, admission, progression and completion must be open and fair.

This programme of education has been developed for the purpose of preparing those midwives who, upon successful completion of the programme, intend to seek appointment as a supervisor of midwives in accordance with Rule 8 of the Midwives rules and standards. Entry onto the programme requires the midwife to undergo the relevant local supervising authority's selection process in partnership with the programme leader within the AEI.

Standard 4: Programme providers must support students to achieve the programme outcomes and support educators to meet their own professional development needs.

All student SoMs must be allocated a mentor who meets the NMC Standards to support learning and assessment in practice (NMC, 2008) and is a current supervisor of midwives.

Standard 5: The programme must be structured, designed and delivered to meet the NMC standards and requirements.

5.1 The minimum length of the supervisors of midwives programme must be 26 weeks.

5.2 The programme must be divided equally between practice-based learning and theory and must include a minimum of 90 hours structured learning in practice.

5.3 Programme planning teams must include representatives from key stakeholders including representatives from the LSA, education, currently appointed supervisors of midwives, users of the maternity services, student supervisors of midwives and mentors.

Standard 6: Practice learning opportunities must be safe, effective, integral to the programme and appropriate to programme outcomes.

The practice-based elements of the programme must provide student SoMs with opportunities to observe supervision of midwives in action. To achieve the competencies in practice, student SoMs must have experience of a range supervision activity such as: observation of supervision interviews, attendance at supervisors meetings, involvement with audits of the supervision of midwives, involvement in supervision investigations, policy meetings, clinical governance activities, NMC fitness to practise hearings, providing support to women and midwives as a supervisor of midwives.

Standard 7: The programme outcomes must ensure that the NMC standards for competence are met and that students are fit for practice and fit for award.

7.1 A minimum standard of first degree (NQF level 6, QCF level 6 or equivalent) must be attained, in accordance with the Quality Assurance Agency UK Quality Code for Higher Education, or its equivalent.

7.2 Upon completion of the programme the mentor and programme leader must confirm that the student supervisor of midwives (SoM) has achieved all learning outcomes and competencies through practice and theory based assessments.

7.3 The lead midwife for education must inform the NMC and the LSA Midwifery Officer that the student supervisor of midwives has successfully completed the approved programme.
