## **Decision and reasons on interim order**

The panel decided to confirm the current interim suspension order.

Unless there has been a material change of circumstances, a reviewing panel will review the interim suspension order at an administrative meeting within the next six months. A reviewing panel will be invited by the NMC to confirm the interim suspension order at this meeting and Mr Wasswa will be notified of that panel's decision in writing following that meeting.

Alternatively, Mr Wasswa is entitled to have the interim suspension order reviewed at a hearing. This means that Mr Wasswa will be able to attend and make representations, send a representative on Mr Wasswa's behalf or submit written representations about whether the interim order continues to be necessary. Mr Wasswa must inform his case officer if he would like the interim suspension order to be reviewed at a hearing.

Even if Mr Wasswa does not request a hearing, where there has been a material change of circumstances that might mean that the interim order should be revoked or replaced, a reviewing panel will review the interim suspension order at a hearing which Mr Wasswa and his representative will be invited to attend.

Mr Wasswa should notify the NMC immediately of any material change of circumstances that may affect the interim order.

At any time, Mr Wasswa or the NMC may ask for the interim order to be reviewed by a panel if any relevant new information becomes available.

The NMC Case Examiners are yet to decide whether there is a case to answer in relation to the allegations made against Mr Wasswa. The NMC will write to Mr Wasswa when the case is ready for the next stage of the fitness to practise process.

This will be confirmed to Mr Wasswa in writing.

That concludes this determination.
