Agreed Removal Decision

Registrant: Hannah Margaret Horsburgh

On 18 April 2024, we received a referral raising a concern about Hannah Margaret Horsburgh's fitness to practise. It's alleged that during 2023, Hannah Margaret Horsburgh:

- didn't adequately monitor a patient's blood sugar levels
- falsely told a colleague that monitoring had been carried out and provided them with a fictitious reading
- on two occasions for two different patients recorded false information in clinical records to conceal a lack of monitoring
- failed to administer IV fluids to a patient properly.

Hannah Margaret Horsburgh accepts the concerns and accepts that her fitness to practise is impaired.

The case has been referred to the Fitness to Practise Committee. No allegation against Hannah Margaret Horsburgh has yet been found substantively proved by one of our statutory committees.

On 2 June 2026, we received an application from Hannah Margaret Horsburgh for agreed removal from the NMC register.

ASSISTANT REGISTRAR'S DECISION

As an Assistant Registrar, I have delegated authority to make decisions about agreed removal and have agreed to removal from the NMC register in this case.

In accordance with Rule 14 of the Nursing and Midwifery Council (Education, Registration and Registration Appeals) Rules 2004, in considering Hannah Margaret Horsburgh's application for agreed removal, I've taken into account:

- comments received from the person who made the allegation against Hannah Margaret Horsburgh
- the reasons for the decision to refer the case to the Fitness to Practise Committee
- the NMC investigation report and supporting evidence

- the interests of Hannah Margaret Horsburgh and the information she's provided
- the public interest.

I'm satisfied that:

- Hannah Margaret Horsburgh no longer intends to work as a registered nurse
- while very serious, the alleged dishonesty is limited to two instances of short-lived, spontaneous conduct and does not involve wrongly blaming or falsely accusing others
- Hannah Margaret Horsburgh has engaged in the process, shown meaningful insight, accepts the facts of the allegation and that her fitness to practise is impaired
- there are no issues in dispute that would need to be resolved by the Fitness to Practise Committee
- in all the circumstances, the public interest is best served by agreeing the application for removal and enabling Hannah Margaret Horsburgh to leave the NMC register.

We'll publish a record of this decision for twelve months from the date of the decision, **15 July 2026**. In the event that Hannah Margaret Horsburgh seeks readmission to the register, we may consider the matters that led to this agreed removal further.
