#### **Summary**

#### **Summary of modification request**

Birmingham City University (BCU) identified that the current design of the first year of the pre-registration BSc (Hons) midwifery programme is having a negative impact on student learning and achievement. There's been a consultation with students, academic and practice learning partners (PLPs) and external examiners, all of whom are in agreement with changing the structure of the first year. The proposal is to create two 30 credit modules from four existing 15 credit modules and align the new learning outcomes and assessment. Programme learning outcomes remain the same. The module learning outcomes for the existing four modules have been reviewed and amalgamated into new outcomes for the proposed modules. The proposed new modules will also reduce student assessment workload from two examinations, a case study and a viva voce to one unseen examination and a case study.

Documentary evidence was submitted by the programme team to support the proposed change and a telephone meeting was held with programme team representatives on 13 June 2019.

The evidence presented demonstrates consultation and partnership working between BCU, students and PLPs in the development of the proposed programme modification. The programme changes are scheduled to commence with the new first year cohort from 16 September 2019.

The programme continues to meet the Standards for pre-registration midwifery education NMC, (2009).

The major modification is recommended to the NMC for approval.

## Feedback from key stakeholders

#### **Presenting Team**

The team explained that the proposed modifications are needed to address concerns about student attrition and assessment workload. The timeline for BCU quality assurance was explained as documentation indicates the process began in 2018. It was confirmed that the delay was due to internal meeting dates and that external examiners and PLPs continue to support the proposed change. The team described the module modifications clearly and provided a rationale for the change to learning outcomes in relation to medicine management. Documentation





confirmed that assessment of medicine management continues to take place in year one and that the essential skills cluster is embedded in practice learning outcomes.

#### **General requirements**

The following requirements for selection should be read and operated alongside programme providers' existing policies and procedures:

#### 4.1 Selection

Wherever practicable, the selection process should include a face-to-face meeting.

Programme providers (AEIs and their service partners) are encourage, wherever possible, to involve lay people and midwifery students in the selection process. Depending on local circumstances they may be involved directly or indirectly in selection.

All individuals in the selection process should receive appropriate training, preparation and updating which includes equality and diversity.

Representatives of partner service provider organisations should be directly involved in the selection process.





The views of the individuals directly involved in selecting applicants should be taken into account when making final decisions on whether to accept or reject an applicant.

#### 4.2 Literacy and numeracy

AEIs are required to ensure that applicants for pre-registration midwifery education programmes have provided evidence of literacy and numeracy that includes prior achievement of basic skills sufficient to undertake a pre-registration midwifery programme of education to a satisfactory level of attainment.

#### 4.3 Good health and good character

Applicants must demonstrate that they have good health and good character sufficient for safe and effective practice as a midwife, on entry to, and for continued participation in, programmes leading to registration with the NMC.

Applicants from overseas must meet the good health and good character as defined for UK applicants and additionally those requirements set out by the UK government for healthcare workers from overseas

#### 4.4 Entry to the register

The NMC requires a self-declaration of good health and good character from all those entering the register for the first time. On completion of the midwifery programme the student will submit this self declaration. The declaration is either supported by the LME, whose name has been notified to the Council and who is responsible for midwifery education in the relevant AEI, or by her designated registered midwife substitute. AEIs must be able to provide evidence of having fulfilled this requirement.

Module documentation provided for the modification indicates that teacher contact hours will be reduced within the new modules. The team confirmed that this was an error and that the contact hours were 60 per 30 credit module which maintain the existing approved pattern and theory to practice ratio. Updated module descriptors and internal quality assurance documentation were provided to confirm this. In addition, the head of department confirmed that the academic staff resource is sufficient to deliver the programme.

Clinical practice must be graded and be counted as part of the academic award.

All outcomes within a progression point period (for example an academic year) have to be achieved and confirmed within 12 weeks of entering the next academic level. All assessments must be completed and have been passed prior to successful completion of the programme.

A student midwife shall achieve these standards under the supervision of a signoff mentor.

#### What we found:

The modification rationale and new module specifications provide evidence of a reduced number of theoretical assessments from four to two in the revised first year of the programme. There's a case study linked to the new 'foundations of midwifery and antenatal care' module and an unseen examination in the new 'post-natal mother and baby 'module. The programme team confirmed the graded assessment of practice remains unchanged.

#### **Achieving the NMC standards**

#### Standard 17: Competencies required to achieve the NMC standards

Students need to be proficient in all standards by the end of their training in order to practise safely and effectively as a midwife without the need for direct supervision. A student must demonstrate competence in these standards to enter the register as a midwife.

#### What we found:

The documentary evidence and findings from the discussion with the programme team confirm that the proposed new modules are appropriate, reflect contemporary practice and enable students to develop proficiency to meet the standards.

A mapping document was provided to demonstrate how the previous module content has been moved into the new modules. The programme team told us that the new module structure will improve student learning and reduce repetition of content. The new module outcomes don't include an explicit reference to medicine management which was present in a previous module. The programme team explained that medicine management is integrated across the proposed year one modules. The module lead confirmed that the essential skills cluster for medicine management is addressed in the module 'clinical practice one'. This
