# **Summary of review and findings**

The University of Hull (UoH) is an established approved education institution (AEI). UoH faculty of health sciences (the faculty) present the community practitioner nurse prescribing V100 and V150 preparation programmes for NMC approval. The independent and supplementary prescribing (V300) programme is in approval since 09 December 2019. The proposed major modification by documentary review is to approve the V100 and V150 awards ensuring they meet the NMC Standards for prescribing programmes (SPP) (NMC, 2018) and Standards of proficiency for nurse and midwife prescriber (adoption of the Royal Pharmaceutical Society (RPS), 2016) competency framework for all prescribers) (NMC, 2018).

The programmes are mapped against the SPP and RPS. The V100 award at academic level six and seven is a mandatory integrated element of the BSc and postgraduate diploma in community care district nursing programme (SPQ DN). It's an option module for health visiting students undertaking the BSc and postgraduate diploma in community care specialist community public health nursing (SCPHN) programme. It's a 20-credit module in each programme. The V150 award at academic level six and seven is a 20-credit standalone module. It is accessed by community staff nurses working in district nursing teams. The modules are delivered jointly over 10 days with10 days protected practice learning and undertaken in semester two of the SPQ DN and SCPHN programmes

Arrangements at programme level meet the Standards framework for nursing and midwifery education (SFNME).



#### Findings against the standard and requirements

Documentary evidence and discussion with the programme teams confirm there's effective partnership working between UoH and key stakeholders. The programme teams present evidence of consultation with service users and carers, students, and practice learning partners (PLPs).

There's evidence of student engagement in the review of the programmes. The faculty require student representation at programme management and advisory group (PMG) meetings. The SPQ DN and SCPHN PMG meeting agenda includes V100 and V150 prescribing as a standing item. The programme teams confirm V150 students are included in the process due to the shared learning approach. Student feedback from meetings inform future programme development. Documentary evidence confirms students provide feedback on learning experiences through programme evaluation. The programme teams are responsible for ensuring the outcome of any actions required in response to student feedback are implemented, reviewed, and monitored through university quality assurance processes. Practice learning is evaluated by students with the pebblepad e-portfolio detailing communication process between the practice supervisor, practice assessor and academic assessor to identify student concerns. Student facing documentation ensures they're advised about and have access to, the procedure for raising concerns.

Minutes from PMG meetings confirm PLP engagement in the development of both programmes. There's evidence PLPs work with programme teams to review the ongoing management of the programmes in the academic and practice learning environments. Programme teams describe how meetings are representative of prescribing PLPs. Attendance by organisational non-medical prescribing (NMP) leads and practising V100 and V150 community practitioner nurse prescribers provide evidence of effective partnerships.

Service user and carer involvement is evident in theory and practice learning. Service users and carers provide feedback in a specific section of the pebblepad e-portfolio. Students must provide written reflection on feedback and discuss this with their practice assessor. Programme handbooks detail specific inclusion of service user and carer perspectives on prescribing and medication use. There's

documentary evidence of service user and carer direct involvement in the development of programmes. Service users and carers are not directly involved in the recruitment of students to the prescribing programmes. The V100 programme team confirm service user and carer questions are used for the SPQ DN and SCPHN interviews.

The programme team are suitability qualified to deliver the programme. They are registered with the General Pharmaceutical Council (GPhc) and the NMC with SPQ DN, V300 prescribing and NMC teacher qualifications. The programme leaders are actively engaged in national prescribing and SPQ DN networks.

R1.3 is met. Documentary evidence confirms governance structures are in place. Applicants to the SPQ DN and SCPHN programmes are interviewed by their employer organisations and a member of the programme team.

All applicants must evidence they meet the entry requirements for V100 and V150 prescribing in line with the approved application process. The V150 application form requires employers to confirm there's support to undertake the programme. They must verify practice learning is protected and there's access to a practising





community practitioner nurse prescribing practice assessor. Applicants to both programmes require a disclosure and barring service (DBS) check. The employer confirms candidates can demonstrate numeracy skills and detail how this is demonstrated. The practice learning environment must have a suitable educational audit in place to ensure practice learning is supported. There's a checklist process which candidates to both programmes must complete. This includes evidence that they have discussed the relevance of prescribing to their role with their organisational NMP lead and how the qualification will be used.

Programme teams provide a pre-course briefing at the end of semester one; eight weeks before the programmes commence. All V100 SPQ DN and SCPHN students and V150 candidates attend the briefing session which provides an overview of the programmes. Students undertake a maths screening test which enables programme teams to assess numeracy skills and if required, direct students to further maths study skills support. V100 students are directly referred for additional maths support if they score below five out of the eight set questions. V150 candidates who achieve this level in the test can access this support however they're advised to discuss their suitability for the programme with their organisational NMP leads. The programme teams describe the partnership approach and commitment of PLP NMP leads to support potential students to develop numeracy skills in preparation for undertaking the programmes.

They attend a preparation workshop; the programme teams describe how they introduce the pebblepad e-portfolio and provide practice assessor and





practice supervisor handbooks. The workshop presentation is recorded and included in the pebblepad e-portfolio. Practice supervisors and practice assessors must declare they have reviewed the presentation. Practice assessors and practice supervisors have access to the pebblepad e-portfolio. The programme teams direct practice assessors and practice supervisors who can't attend the workshop to the presentation. They confirm they provide support for individual practice assessors and practice supervisors if required to ensure they are fully prepared for their roles. The programme team are advised to review how practice assessors and practice supervisors engage with the recorded workshop. (Recommendation one)
