Summary of review and findings

The school of nursing (the school) at Kingston University and St George's University of London (KSGU), faculty of health, social care and education present a modification to their undergraduate pre-registration nursing programme, approved on 31 May 2020. The modification introduces an adult nursing apprenticeship. This route is delivered part-time over three years and nine months. The programme is designed to meet the Standards for pre-registration nursing programmes (SPNP) (Nursing and Midwifery Council (NMC), 2018).

Practice requirements and achievements are measured using the pan-London practice assessment document (PLPAD). Employer partners (EPs) supporting this apprenticeship route are Kingston Hospital, Your Healthcare, BMI - Shirley Oaks Hospital, Croydon CCG, Brigstock Medical Practice, Sussex Community NHS Foundation Trust, Hounslow and Richmond Community Healthcare NHS Trust, Epsom and St Helier University Hospital NHS Trust and St George's University Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust. All EPs provide a statement of commitment to support students undertaking the apprenticeship route.

Apprenticeship students have blocks of theory at the university, blocks of supernumerary practice learning and blocks of time in employment. Employer time isn't included in NMC programme hours. The end point assessment (EPA) is fully integrated.

Programme documentation and the approval process confirm evidence of effective partnership working between KSGU the approved education institution (AEI) and key stakeholders.

The major modification confirms the Standards framework for nursing and midwifery education (SFNME) (NMC, 2018) aren't met at programme level.

The Standards for student supervision and assessment (SSSA) (NMC, 2018) are met at programme level.

The programme is recommended to the NMC for approval subject to one specific condition. There are three university conditions. One NMC recommendation and one joint NMC and university recommendation are made.

Updated 4 May 2021:

Additional documentation provides evidence of the distinctiveness of the degree apprenticeship route. The NMC condition is met.

The AEI confirm that the three university conditions are met.

Findings against the standard and requirements

Provide an <u>evaluative summary</u> about the effectiveness of the partnerships between the AEI and their practice learning partners, service users, students and any other stakeholders.

KSGU present a degree nurse apprenticeship route in adult nursing. The major modification process confirms the AEI is committed to robust and effective partnership working with EPs, students and SUCs in the development, delivery and evaluation of the programme at strategic and operational levels. The existence of interdependent relationships with EPs, practice supervisors, practice assessors and multi-disciplinary teams is evident. There's evidence of strategic organisational leadership and effective communication systems to manage risks, set goals and to plan and introduce change if required.

Agreements outline a partnership approach between KSGU and EPs with shared responsibilities for theory, practice, supervision and assessment. Partnership and shared responsibility are evident through student selection and recruitment processes. Applicants for the apprenticeship route must be employed within a health or social care setting. All applicants who meet the minimum requirements are required to attend a selection day which includes a value-based interview and an informal assessment of the applicant's current digital literacy skills.

Mechanisms are in place in theory and practice learning for stakeholders to give timely feedback to students and promote their reflective learning. Quality enhancement processes between KSGU and EPs ensure student evaluation and feedback is robust and issues raised are addressed. Students have opportunities throughout the programme to collaborate and learn with and from academic staff, other professionals. SUCs and peers.





KSGU, in partnership with EPs, ensure there are a range of practice learning opportunities in place that equip students to meet people's diverse needs across the lifespan. The AEI is a member of the pan-London practice learning group (PLPLG), working with other AEIs across London who have contributed to the development and continued implementation of the PLPAD and ongoing achievement record (OAR) to meet the SPNP. The PLPAD will be used to plan, record and assess learning in practice for students undertaking the apprenticeship programme.

Students say they have a partnership role in their programme's continued delivery and review. Students confirm they're consulted about the new programme.

We met with SUC representatives who are enthusiastic and committed to participating in programme planning, delivery and student selection. SUCs confirm valuable engagement in the delivery of nursing education within the school. They welcome opportunities to support student learning. SUCs present at the visit aren't aware of the distinctive requirements for students undertaking an apprenticeship route, with students having both practice learning and employment time when in EP organisations. The panel recommend the team consider enhancing SUC preparation related to the apprenticeship route. (Recommendation two)
