Section two

Summary of review and findings

Sheffield Hallam University (SHU), the approved education institution (AEI), college of health, wellbeing and life sciences is presenting for approval the satellite campus of Doncaster College University campus (DCUC), department of education, health and community practice. SHU present an approved four-year part-time BSc (Hons) pre-registration nursing adult route for delivery at DCUC.

This is a major modification to the BSc (Hons) nursing pre-registration (part-time) programme. The full-time pre-registration programme was approved on 20 February 2019, modified to provide a postgraduate route on 15 January 2020 and modified further to provide a part-time route on 29 May 2020.

The programme consultation logs, documents and major modification process confirm collaboration and co-production between the AEI, DCUC, practice learning partners (PLPs) and service users and carers (SUCs) in developing the programme and delivering it at the satellite campus of DCUC. All stakeholders are enthusiastic in their support of this modification.

Doncaster and Bassetlaw Teaching Hospitals NHS Foundation Trust, Rotherham, Doncaster and South Humber NHS Foundation Trust and independent and voluntary organisations support the proposed programme. The practice assessment document Midlands, Yorkshire and east practice assessment document (MYEPAD) developed by PLPs and AEIs in the pan-Midlands, Yorkshire and east practice learning group will be used to assess practice.

Facilities at DCUC have the capacity and resources in place to deliver safe and effective learning. Future building developments are planned to further enhance the student learning environment. The students' learning experience is led by SHU academic staff with the support of appropriately qualified academic staff at DCUC.

Documentation and arrangements at institution and at programme level meet the Standards for student supervision and assessment (SSSA) (NMC, 2018) and Standards framework for nursing and midwifery education (SFNME) (NMC,2018).

The major modification to the programme is recommended to the NMC for approval.

Findings against the standard and requirements

Provide an <u>evaluative summary</u> about the effectiveness of the partnerships between the AEI and their practice learning partners, service users, students and any other stakeholders.

Consultation logs and documentation and the major modification process detail collaboration and co-production between the AEI, DCUC, PLPs and SUCs in preparing for programme delivery at DCUC. Stakeholders we met have a clear understanding of the requirements for programme delivery. There is enthusiasm from key stakeholders for the modification.

At the modification visit, senior management from SHU and DCUC tell us of their commitment to the delivery of the programme at the DCUC site. The DCUC current staff and resources, together with resources planned for the future, support programme delivery at DCUC.

The documentation evidences that students have access to academic, disability, wellbeing, counselling, careers, library, information technology (IT) support, student union facilities services and support at both the Sheffield and DCUC sites. The programme team confirm this and say each student will have an academic tutor for support and to signpost students to appropriate services.

DCUC students confirm they receive support from the library, IT, wellbeing and counselling services and from their academic tutors. They have a named academic adviser from DCUC who they are able to access for support and guidance.

Delivery of the programme is in partnership with SHU and DCUC. The programme team tell us that modules are led and delivered by existing SHU module staff, with DCUC staff contributing to some of the teaching. As DCUC staff gain experience, their contribution to teaching and assessment will increase. The quality enhancement of assessment, moderation and external examiner processes are the same for SHU and DCUC students.

Documentation and the programme team tell us that students at DCUC are undertaking the same evaluation process and feedback as students on the SHU programme. A recommendation is made for the programme team to consider





bespoke programme evaluation for the small cohort of students based at DCUC to ensure equivalent experience with SHU students. (Recommendation one)

Documentation shows that a SUC is part of the development of the modification and is part of the programme team at the modification visit. SUCs contribute to teaching in the approved programme. Documentary evidence identifies more locally based SUCs are to be recruited, to ensure views of local SUCs are reflected. The programme team tell us students have to gain feedback from SUCs on their placement as part of their practice assessment.

PLPs confirm satisfaction with the partnership with SHU and DCUC. They say their needs and those of the local community are addressed in developing this initiative. PLPs say communication and networking with SHU is highly effective. Programme documentation and the modification process evidence that effective partnership arrangements are in place for the preparation and support of practice supervisors and practice assessors.

Processes are in place for poor Care Quality Commission (CQC) reports or poor student evaluations. PLPs and SHU describe actions taken and provide examples of working together to ensure a quality learning environment is provided and public safety is maintained.

There are support strategies for students at DCUC to continuously develop their abilities in numeracy, literacy, digital and technological literacy to meet programme outcomes. The learning resource centre (LRC) is Wi-Fi enabled and all students are encouraged to bring their own portable devices. The library facilities are currently over two floors (level three and four). Level three contains extensive ranges of books (65,000) and journals, as well as librarian and technology support. There are 54 open access e-computer terminals to enable students to access technology enhanced learning and the virtual learning environment for private study. Private study areas, group rooms and breakout rooms are available within the library for students' use. Level four of the LRC is the main teaching area for students undertaking higher education study, with classrooms, clinical simulation rooms and bookable breakout





A virtual design of the accommodation planned to be made on the fifth floor to accommodate future cohorts of students is presented. This includes a student social space, four bay area for clinical and community skills simulation and a bespoke private study area. Senior college management and the teaching team tell us this accommodation will be completed by January 2022.

Documentation shows students have a prescribing workbook to complete across the programme which develops abilities in numeracy, prescribing and practice skills in preparation for their practice experience.

Documentation and the major modification process show that each student at DCUC has an academic adviser to oversee their continuous professional development. This is confirmed by the programme team and the students.

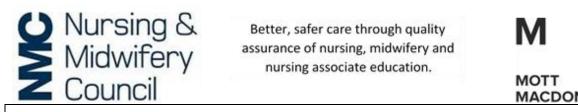

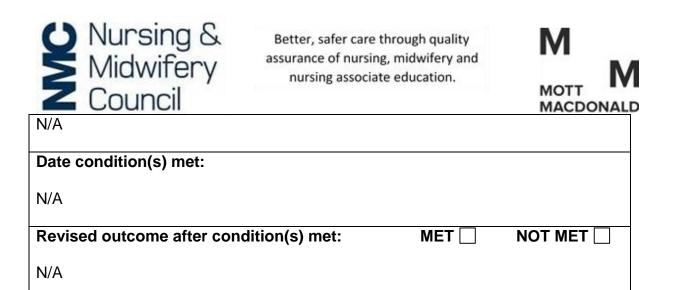
